4.9% increase in incidents, compared to the previous year.



43.7% of incidents had a child present (June 2022-July 2023)

In 2022 Latrobe was #1 in the state, now they are #3, however they have had a 4.5% increase in family violence call outs. The reduction in ranking is because of larger increases in East Gippsland and Mildura.

#### **Baw Baw**

76.13% affected family members identified as female. 23.68% identified as male.



21.21% increase in incidents, compared to the previous year.



53.2% of incidents had a child present (June 2022-July 2023)

Baw Baw has the second highest growth rate in the state at a population increase at 2.1%. This is thought to be contributing to the increased rate of family violence.

Gippsland LGA's have high rates of family violence due to <u>gender inequality</u> which has resulted in unequal outcomes for men and women in economic, education and health opportunities within our Gippsland communities.

Family Violence exists in all our communities, regardless of race, gender, religion or economic status, with much of it going unreported and unseen.

## East Gippsland



Total population: 48,715 (2021 Census)

74.70% affected family members identified as female. 24.73% identified as male.



15.32% increase in incidents, compared to the previous year.



47.8% of incidents had a child present (June 2022-July 2023)

East Gippsland's increase is unexplained at this time. It may indicate increased trust in Vic Pol and also be correlated to cost of living increases. East Gippsland has had a decrease in call outs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in 2023.

## Wellington



Total population: 45,639 (2021 Census)

in the state for family violence police call outs (per 100,000 population)

total incidents responded to



72.49% affected family members identified as female, 27,34% identified as male.



0.34% decrease in incidents, compared to the previous year.



47.6% of incidents had a child present (June 2022-July 2023)

In 2022, Wellington was #4 in the State, now they are #8. However, the rate of family violence has remained almost the same. The decrease in ranking is because of large increases in the Central Highland region.
